

Further Practice

- 1. A language like English is difficult to learn, so therefore students must work hard.
- 2. To do better in exams, students must do their homework.
- 3. To be more profitable, companies must reduce costs.

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Grammatical description of techniques

- Front Loading Putting the key noun of interest at the front of the sentence
- Vocabulary choice Choose words with the best connotations. Island, suggests a small place rather than country. (Use a thesaurus and dictionary to help.)
- Never the naked city For people who don't know Malta well, add something of interest so that people can empathise with the place.
- Questions People will naturally answer questions and this will increase the attention of your audience.
- Signal Indicates something important is coming and provides linkage.
- Triplet Say three things to emphasise a point
- Capper / Finisher End with a big statement, even if it is exaggerated
- Inclining adjectives Start with a normal adjective (important) and then add an extreme adjective (essential).

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Teacher's notes

Lesson idea

Warmer: Either cut up the matching version or use the gap fill version above to revise extreme adjectives.

- 1. Get students to have a go at rewriting the text, perhaps as a paired writing exercise. They can then compare their ideas.
- 2. Show them version 2 and see if they can use any of the techniques for improving their own speech writing.
- 3. Elicit the grammar points. (And further examples if necessary)
- 4. Ask students to use the techniques to do the further practice.
